**Due to the confirmed cases of rabies in Franklin County we have decided until Further notice, all Goats being shown at the Franklin County Fair will have to be vaccinated for rabies by your veterinarian.**

Sunday August 6<sup>th</sup> 2017

Show begins at 8 A.M.

\*\*\* Please have all animal in Show Arena by 7:00 A.M. \*\*\*

**Entry Fee: \$2.00 per class**

Entry fees are due when entries are made. **No changes in entries will be made after August 3<sup>rd</sup>.**

**Entry Forms and Money are Due: On or Before July 21st 2017.**

Entries without Entry Fee's will **NOT BE ACCEPTED.**

**Premiums paid:** 1<sup>st</sup> - \$20.00 – 2<sup>nd</sup> - \$15.00 – 3<sup>rd</sup> - \$10.00 – 4<sup>th</sup> - \$8.00 – 5<sup>th</sup> - \$6.00

Ribbons will be awarded to 1<sup>st</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup> place.

Trophies or Plaques will be awarded for Junior Best Doe in Show and Senior Best Doe in Show & Best Boer Goat

**Only two (2) entries per class**

**No late entries will be accepted. No entries will be taken the day of the show, switching of classes is not allowed,** and there will be no exception to these rules. **There will be no changes made to entries after July 21<sup>st</sup>.** **Check all your entries to make sure they are correct before sending them in. We are not responsible for incorrect entries.** Goats staying all week must be in place by 4 P.M. on Saturday, the first day of the fair. No animals will be allowed to leave before 8 P.M. on Sunday, the last day of the fair, to qualify for the 20% extra premium for staying all week.

\*\*Please include any Pack Animals, 4-H Animals on your entry forms to be included for Barn Space.

The rules printed herein are made a part of conditions which all entries of the exhibitor are made, and exhibitors are respectfully requested to read them carefully thereby avoiding confusion at the time of show.

1. The show may have two rings and two judges, depending on the number of animals entered.
2. The Franklin County Dairy Goat Show is limited to **Franklin County Residents**, with the exception of those who stay all week. **Boer Goats only** are open to all counties, but with a limit of ten (10) animals per exhibitor unless you are a Franklin County Resident then there is not limit. Unless staying all week.
3. See rules and regulations for ADGA Sanctioned Show.
4. Barn space will be provided only for those animals staying on grounds all week. Provided there is barn space available. It will be on a first come first serve basis.
5. **Exhibitors Meeting: Date to be determined; all exhibitors wishing to stay all week must attend this meeting to be assigned barn space. This would also include any 4-H Animals planning on staying all week (Pack Goats too).**

6. Entries staying all week (from the first Sunday to the last Sunday of the fair) will receive a 20% increase in premium money, provided your pens are cleaned when you leave the Fairgrounds.
7. Junior Doe's in all breeds will show first, then Senior Doe's.
8. As soon as Best Doe in Show is complete, the ring must be cleared and cleaned.
9. Exhibitors are reminded the Society and or the Judge has the right to not award premiums for an unworthy exhibit.
10. Herd's person must care for exhibits at least twice daily, if not more.
11. Exhibitor passes are \$12.00 each and include parking when available. Passes are non-transferable and will be sold only to those exhibiting animals all week. Children 12 and under are admitted free all week. Those who bring in animals for just the one show will not get passes; their names will be left at the gate.
12. No horned animals allowed.
13. **Each breed must be entered on a different entry form. Please keep numbers in numerical order as they appear in the premium book, as this will reduce errors.**
14. All dairy goats are entered at the sole risk of the owners.
15. All tattooing is to be done prior to entering the fair grounds, and must be legible.
16. No exhibitor or anyone else under the age of six (6) will be able to show or enter the show ring with an animal, this includes with parental supervision.
17. If you are housing with other animals from a different farm, please note this on the entry form.
18. A.O.P. to include: Saanen, Sable, Nubian's, and Nigerian Dwarfs.
19. The Goat Superintendent is authorized to cause the removal from the buildings and grounds of any failing to meet the Health Requirements specified or if so instructed by the State Inspector. The Management assumes no responsibility in case of loss or damage to stock or to any exhibits from any cause, and reserves the right to order any examination or test deemed necessary to determine the existence of any suspected disease or condition in any animal exhibited.
20. **Anyone staying in the goat barn all week has to have Goat Superintendent Permission.**
21. **The Department Superintendent has the right to remove any exhibitor from the fairgrounds for the mistreatment of their animals.**
22. **No Intact males allowed on the Grounds.**

Animal Health Requirements For  
Admission to New York State and County Fairs  
(Part 351 of NYS Agriculture and Markets Regulations)

**General Prohibitions and Requirements**

- No person shall bring or have present an animal on the fairgrounds during a fair which is not qualified under NYS regulations.
- No person shall present an interstate or intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection that has been altered by anyone other than the issuing veterinarian or an authorized agent.
- Animals demonstrating clinical signs or other evidence of infectious, contagious or communicable diseases shall not be allowed on the fairgrounds during a fair.
- Representatives of the Commissioner may deny admission to or require removal from the fair premises, or require the segregation of any animal showing signs of or exposed to any infectious, contagious or communicable disease.
- Note: The fair board of directors has the authority to reject unworthy or unsightly exhibits for reasons other than infectious, contagious or communicable disease (Part 350.10). The state veterinarian or animal health inspector will bring questionable exhibits to the attention of the fair board.
- All animals presented that originate from a location other than New York shall meet all New York State importation regulations appropriate to the species in addition to the fair animal health requirements.

**Certificates of Veterinary Inspection (CVI)**

- Cattle, sheep, goats, swine, llamas, deer, monkeys, misc. ruminants, camels and elephants require a valid CVI to enter the fairgrounds.
- The CVI must be issued by an accredited veterinarian.
- All animals must be uniquely identified. All manmade ID must be recorded. Refer to Animal Identification section below for more information.
- Only one species is allowed per certificate.
- The type and duration of certificate required depends on the origin of the livestock.

**New York Origin Livestock:**

- A valid intrastate CVI (AI 61) is required.
- Each animal must be individually identified on the CVI.
- The CVI must be issued on or after May 1 of the current year.

### **Out of State Origin Livestock:**

- All animals entering New York State must satisfy import health and test requirements for that species and be accompanied by a valid interstate CVI.
- The interstate CVI is valid for 30 days from the date of issuance. During the fair season (July 1 through Labor Day) valid CVI's can be used multiple times for entrance into fairs. The initial entrance into a fair must be within 30 days of issuance. In order for the CVI to be used for a later fair, it must be dated and initialed by a state official noting the location of the initial fair. A change in health status or eligibility of an animal necessitates the generation of a new CVI.

### **Animal Identification**

- Animals requiring a CVI must be uniquely identified. Acceptable forms of unique identification include official eartag, legible registration tattoo or electronic identification (microchip). A sketch or photograph signed and dated by an accredited veterinarian is acceptable identification for llamas and alpacas.
- If electronic ID is utilized as the sole form of identification, the exhibitor is responsible for supplying a working electronic reader. If electronic ID cannot be read entry will be denied.
- Acceptable identification allows positive matching of the animal to all accompanying documents including papers with laboratory test results and vaccination statements.
- A name or a statement of color without additional distinguishing features or manmade identification is not acceptable identification.
- USDA approved scrapie identification is required for all sheep and goats.

### **Rabies Vaccination**

- Current rabies vaccination is required for all species for which there is a USDA licensed vaccine available (cattle, horses, sheep, dog, cat, ferret) and that are 105 days or older on the date of admission to the fair.
- An animal is currently vaccinated beginning 14 days following primary (initial) vaccination continuing for the period stated in the manufacturer's Instructions.
- Rabies vaccine label instructions allow vaccination as early as 84 days of age. This allows a one week window between 84 and 91 days of age (105 minus 14 days) where vaccine can be administered to meet the 105 day requirement.
- If an animal reaches the minimum age for rabies vaccination during the fair season, the vaccination requirement must be met even if the animal was previously admitted to a fair when too young to vaccinate.
- Note: Individual fairs can require animals for which there is no approved rabies vaccine to be currently vaccinated for rabies. The requirements outlined above would apply. The fair is responsible for notifying exhibitors.
- The New York State Fair requires rabies vaccination for all livestock species entering the grounds.

### **Acceptable Proof of Rabies Vaccination.**

- Acceptable proof of rabies vaccination must include a signed written statement from the attending veterinarian or a valid certificate of veterinary inspection that has the vaccination listed and is signed by the attending veterinarian.
- Acceptable proof of vaccination must include the name of the product used, the date of administration and the duration of immunity if longer than one year.
- If the statement of rabies vaccination is included on an EIA test record, it must be signed separately in addition to the required EIA test record signature.
- **NOTE:** Rabies titers are not acceptable proof of rabies protection and cannot be used to meet entry requirements.

## Kidding and Lambing

- Due to the concern about the spread of scrapie, any sheep or goats that are exhibited at a county fair that have recently given birth or have a vaginal discharge, will be ordered removed along with their offspring.
- The causative agent for scrapie may be present in high concentration in fluids associated with birth and the risk of transmission is considered highest at that time.

## Isolation on Returning Home

- The owner or custodian shall keep show animals biologically separate from the herd or flock for a period of at least two weeks after returning to the premises of origin.

## Individual Species Requirements

### Goats

- Certificate of Veterinary Inspection with animals individually identified with USDA approved individual scrapie program identification. Identification must be one of the following: 1) USDA approved tags or 2) a legible registration tattoo or 3) a USDA approved herd tattoo and individual animal ID number or 4) electronic ID if the goat is enrolled in the Scrapie Flock Certification Program and/or the electronic ID is recorded on the goats registration paper (owner must supply a working electronic reader).
- For information on scrapie ID, contact USDA at 518-218-7540.
- The CVI must contain a written statement from the issuing accredited veterinarian that the herd of origin was inspected after May 1 of the current year and no evidence of contagious, infectious or communicable diseases was found.
- If evidence of soremouth (contagious ecthyma) is found on any goat, the entire exhibit including the affected animals shall immediately be removed from the fair premises with the holding pens cleaned and disinfected immediately after removal.

**269. Senior get of sire:** To consist of three Does, the Get of Sire, from at least two different Dams. Sire must be named on entry form. All does need to be in milk. **(Not Boers)**

**270. Dam and Daughter:** To consist of one (1) dam and one (1) daughter, all must be owned by exhibitor or family. **(Not Boers)**

**271. Dairy Herd:** to consist of 4 does in milk, all must be owned by one exhibitor or family. **(Not Boers)**

**272. Best Udder in show. (Not Boers)**

**273. Best pair of Kids (Boer Class Only)**

**274. Best pair of seniors (Boer Class Only)**
